Wout is a member of OPTA's Team Internet Safety since 2004. As such he participated in several investigations, led hearings, interviewed suspects and coordinated efforts at an on site investigation. He represents OPTA internationally since 2005 and is active in the CNSA e.g. as coordinator and London Action Plan (LAP), was a member of the OECD anti-spam taskforce and was active in ICANN to preserve domain name access for LEA's. For three years he chaired the Dutch cyber crime working group. At present he's OPTA's LAP coordinator, chairs LAPs Best Practice Committee and represents LAP in RIPE's LEA working party. As of May 2010 he is chair of the Cyber Crime Working Party, a public – private cooperation initiative aimed at fighting cyber crime. He represented LAP at various international organizations like the Council of Europe, MAAWG, RIPE, Working party article 29, FIRST and ENISA.

The LAP is a global public-private network of government agencies and industry representatives from over 20 countries that develops coordinated solutions to address the proliferation of spam and related online threats. Since its formation in 2004, the LAP has held periodic teleconferences, met annually, conducted law enforcement trainings, collaborated with industry organizations, including the Messaging Anti-Abuse Working Group and Eco, and fostered bilateral and multilateral cooperation among law enforcement agencies. The U.S. Federal Trade Commission, Industry Canada, and the UK's Office of Fair Trading operate the LAP Secretariat.

OPTA is the Dutch Independent Post and Telecommunication Authority which has as one of her tasks enforcing spam and malware perpetrations.
